Canada's Search for a Papal Apology

For more than 100 years thousands of Canada's First Nations children, Metis and Inuit children were forcibly removed from their homes and sent to boarding schools run by the Catholic church's. Many were beaten, starved and sexually abused. They were forbidden from speaking their native languages and had their culture stripped from them. Thousands died, far away from their families. Canada's Truth and Reconciliation Commission has recommended that the Pope come to Canada to make an apology - similar to the one made to Irish victims of abuse. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has also asked the Pope to do so. But Francis has simply said that he cannot 'personally respond'.(BBC)
